





APCRC LAUNCHING FELLOWSHIP 2017 – Guidance

Applications are invited for 18 months Launching Fellowship from individuals with a strong academic record who wish to develop a career in primary care/community/public health research. The goal of the fellowship is for the appointee to publish papers from their PhD and write an NIHR grant application to secure future funding (e.g. an NIHR fellowship). This opportunity provides successful candidates with a platform to develop as an independent researcher and future leader in research.

Applicants will have obtained their research doctorate or submitted their PhD or MD thesis for examination, but must not normally be more than 3 years post-doctoral at the time of applying. Applicants must have experience of research in primary care/community/public health or a closely related field of medicine. The applicant must be looking to secure their first research grant of a post-doctoral fellowship and therefore, the likelihood of the individual making a successful grant or fellowship application within 2 years of taking up this fellowship is a key selection criterion.

The Launching Fellowship must be taken up by 31st March 2018. Although the successful candidate will be employed by, and based at their current institution, this is a collaborative venture between Avon Primary Care Research Collaborative (APCRC) - hosted at NHS Bristol Clinical Commissioning Group - and the University of Bristol or University of the West of England.

The awards are open to all disciplines relevant to primary care research, including clinical and non-clinical disciplines. A medical or other health related degree is desirable. Applicants who have not had the opportunity to undertake medical training will be considered if they have substantial relevant experience.

Remuneration for Launching Fellowships will be a salary of £32,004-£36,001 per annum.

Launching Fellowship awards may involve working on a specific study (e.g. systematic review or pilot study) that will prepare the way for a larger externally funded grant or successful postdoctoral fellowship application. It will also involve attachment to a research group involved in a programme of research. For information of these programs, please refer to the links below.

Applicants will need to demonstrate outstanding potential to obtain an externally funded research grant or fellowship within 18 months of taking up the fellowship. This might be evidenced, for example, by a good publication record (taking into account their stage of career), involvement in grant applications, and/or signs of high academic ability.

HOW TO MAKE AN APPLICATION

The application process consists of three stages.

Stage 1

Interested individuals should submit their application form along with a 2 page CV and a covering letter of not more than 2 pages. This letter must explain why you wish to train in primary care/community/public health research, your preferred supervisor and area of work. Your application should be sent by email to APCRC (Jessica.pooley@nhs.net).

Please put APCRC Launching Fellowship 2017 as the subject of the email. Applications must be received by 09:00 (GMT) on 6th June 2017. Documents should be saved with the following file name format:

Stage 2

Candidates who are successful at stage 1 will be invited to complete an application form.

Stage 3

Candidates will be invited to an interview at APCRC in September 2017.

The Centre for Academic Primary Care conducts high quality research addressing questions of priority to the NHS. We are a large, friendly and thriving unit within the School of Social and Community Medicine, which includes many world class academics conducting research in different aspects of health services research and epidemiology. We offer the expertise of a wide range of academic staff from clinical and non-clinical backgrounds including statisticians, social scientists and economists. These staff covers a range of methodological approaches, including





RCTs, observational epidemiological studies, qualitative research and economic evaluations. Formal research methods training courses are available in all these areas through a highly popular programme of short courses. The 2014 Research Excellence Framework (REF) confirmed the School's position as a leading centre for research in population health sciences, including primary care, in the UK and internationally. 50% of our research was rated as 4* (world leading), and 86% as 4* or 3* (world leading or internationally excellent). 100% of our research impact case studies were rated as world-leading, as was 100% of our research environment.
