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Please welcome our new **GP lead for the South Bristol Academy Claire Pugh**



Sepsis—what to teach our students? By Alison Tavaré

Each year over 37,000 people in the UK die of sepsis, more than die of lung Ca(30,000), bowel Ca (13,000) or breast Ca (10,000). A recent Ombudsman's report 'Time to Act' has recognised this significant mortality by recommending raising awareness, and improving the diagnosis and management of sepsis. In September 2014 NHS England issued a level 2 alert to all NHS chief executives and Regional medical directors making sepsis a clinical priority.

Severe sepsis, or septicaemia as it used to be known, can be difficult to diagnose. There can be a raised temperature and a raised white cell count; however there may be immune paralysis with a low temperature and a low white cell count.


Localised infection causes no disturbance of physiological measures but there can be a systemic inflammatory response—**SIRs**, resulting in tachycardia, tachypnoea, and temperature above 38 or below 36. The challenge is to identify from this group who may progress to severe sepsis when there is additional organ dysfunction.

In hospital lactate levels are useful, but point of care tests which could help decision making in primary care, have not yet been determined. There is evidence that prompt treatment reduces mortality.

My personal interest started when I had severe sepsis after surgery. Initially I was reluctant to talk about the experience, but since 2012 I have been involved in raising awareness of sepsis; not only in Bristol but attending the Houses of Parliament and being interviewed on BBC Breakfast TV. NICE have been commissioned to develop Guidelines and I have been appointed to this group.

The NICE guidelines will be published in summer 2016 but in the interim the UK Sepsis Trust along with the RCGP, have produced clinical toolkits.
