

How do Deaf people contact 111 and 999?

You may have wondered how Deaf people contact NHS 111 and 999. A helpful website on this subject is: <https://www.signhealth.org.uk/what-is-nhs-111/>
Basically, in order to be able to text 999 you need to first register your phone to use the 999 emergency text service, so that you have this facility in place should you ever need to use 999 in the future. How to register is explained in the link above.
In order to be able to text 111 you don't need to register your phone – instead, simply text the slightly longer number 18001 111.

It's also possible to have a conversation in BSL (British Sign Language) with NHS 111 via the app **InterpreterNow**

<http://interpreternow.co.uk/nhs111>. The service is open from 8 am to midnight every day. Currently there is no equivalent service for 999.
