### 1. Classics Hub website updates

### 2. Roman Britain online workshop

We're pleased to offer a new VIRTUAL workshop on Roman Britain for KS2, completely free and available entirely online. Hub volunteer and doctoral researcher Martina Delucchi has ingeniously crafted a workshop entitled **The Horse's Backside: Roman Britain and Us**, in which she introduces students to the influence of the Romans on aspects of our everyday life.

Martina ran her workshop with a group of 45 students at <u>St Mary Redcliffe</u> <u>Church of England Primary School</u> in early February. The session aimed to give the students an idea of the Roman impact on life in Britain, such as roadways, infrastructures, towns and cities, including some basic Latin vocabulary as the root of certain English place names. The students were so inspired they carried on creating their own Latin sentences even after the session had ended!

#### 3. KS2 Word Roots success!


On Thursday 11th February, **Classics for All** trainer <u>Charlie Andrew</u> ran an afterschool online Word Roots event on behalf of the Bristol Classics Hub for KS2 teachers in Bristol and across the South West.

The workshop had a fantastic turnout, with 21 teachers attending from 16 different schools. Together we explored some key Latin and Greek root words that feature frequently in English, and looked at strategies and resources to help support the teaching of literacy at primary level.

#### 4. ARLT Summer School

The **Association for Latin Teaching** (ARLT) have invited us to run a workshop on making Classics more inclusive at their 98th annual Summer School, which will run in-person at Blundell's School in Tiverton, **26th-30th July.** 

The ARLT is run by practising teachers to provide CPD for practising teachers, including trainees, newly qualified and experienced practitioners.

Their Summer School programme includes lectures by academics from Exeter and Bristol Universities, as well as option groups covering Greek and Latin GCSE and A level set texts, and Classical Civilisation units.

#### 5. Academus Easter Crash Course

<u>Academus Education</u> have announced that they will be running an Easter Crash Course over the first weekend of the Easter holidays (**27th-28th March**).

The course will provide a free online interdisciplinary introduction to classics designed for 14-18-year-olds. It's designed to be an intensive 10-hour insight programme into the ancient world, where students will cover the history and culture of Greece and Rome over two days.

The course will cover a range of topics across Graeco-Roman history and literature. It will also touch on reception studies and will provide an excellent basis for any students considering pursuing Classics at university.



## 6. Bristol Festival of Latin Drama 2021

We are delighted to share news of the **Bristol Festival of Latin Drama 2021** organised by the <u>Bristol Classical Association</u> in partnership with <u>Bristol Grammar School</u> and the Bristol Classics Hub.

#### 8. 'The Homeric World' teachers' course

The <u>British School at Athens</u> is delighted to invite UK school teachers to attend a **FREE** virtual CPD course between **15th-26th April**, focusing on the OCR GCSE Classical Civilisation module 'The Homeric World'.

The course is intended both for those who already teach the new GCSE (or similar specifications), and also for those who have never taught the subject before.

Participants will follow a series of four virtual lectures, introducing the main themes of the module and providing new case studies beyond the GCSE syllabus. By the end of the course, participants will have a sound working knowledge of Bronze Age archaeology and its relationship to the works of Homer, helping them to teach this material to students with confidence.
