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1. Ovid competition winners

On Monday 29th November last year, we hosted a very special afternoon of prize-giving events at <u>The Roman Baths</u> in celebration of our fifth year running the Ovid in the West Country competition.

With 1000+ pupils participating from across 16 local schools, this was our biggest competition yet for which we had a record-breaking number of brilliant,

creative entries... making the competition judging process really tough!

We divided the schools into three separate categories and awarded a first prize for each. The overall winners were a Y7 student from Cardiff High School whose entry on the theme of global warming was inspired by the Daedalus and Icarus myth; a Y7 student from Chipping Campden School who produced a dramatic interpretation of the same story using a range of media; and a Y6 student from St Patrick's Catholic Primary School whose entry of a 3D model and poem was also inspired by Daedalus and Icarus.

Each of the prize-giving ceremonies involved an object handling session in which students were invited to examine replica Roman artefacts, as well as a brilliant dramatic retelling by Daniel Morden of the Phaethon story from Ovid's Metamorphoses. The awards were made by Bob Lister, our guest of honour and creator of the Classic Tales resources.

Congratulations to all those who took part, and a special thank you to the teachers for your hard work and enthusiasm in supporting this competition!

That evening, we were also delighted to host a drinks reception for recent graduates from the PGCE Secondary English course at UWE Bristol who had successfully completed our <u>Classics in the Classroom</u> award scheme.

Congratulations to them all, and many thanks to Joan Foley for her inspiring commitment to introducing Classics into the English classroom.

5. Word Roots for KS2 & KS3

This week on **Thursday 27th January**, our colleagues over at <u>Classics for All North</u> will be running a FREE literacy CPD session via Zoom on 'Word Roots' for state school teachers at KS2 & KS3 (16:00-17:15). Details and sign-up are available here.

Then, on **Thursday 24**th **February**, we are teaming up with our network for <u>London and the South East</u> to provide a similar online 'Word Roots' CPD event (15:30-17:00) aimed specifically at KS2 teachers. Please sign up <u>here</u> to register your interest.

As always, the aim of these introductory sessions is to explore key Latin and Greek root words that feature frequently in English, and discuss strategies and resources to support the teaching of literacy in schools.

No prior knowledge of Latin or Greek is required to attend! As highlighted in Alex Quigley's influential book 'Closing the Vocabulary Gap' (2018), building knowledge of etymology and morphology in the classroom can help pupils to develop greater 'word consciousness', which in turn enables them to better understand and use language.

6. CA Teaching Awards

Do you know an inspiring teacher whose efforts deserve special recognition? Well now's your chance because the Classical Association have announced the <u>CATB Teaching Awards for 2021-22</u> are open for nominations.

These annual awards are designed to recognise outstanding teaching and innovative pre-university education initiatives. Up to five prizes of £500 each will be awarded annually to individuals or projects which have a significant and positive impact on the teaching of Classics in the UK and winners will be announced at the <u>CA Conference in Swansea</u> in April.

Nominations are open until midnight on the **Friday 18**th **February** and can be made via this <u>online form</u> by anyone including students, colleagues, those who volunteer / support / engage with projects, parents / SLT, and the general public.

7. Bristol CA lecture by Dr Shelley Hales

The next lecture Bristol CA lecture will be run as a Zoom webinar on **Wednesday 2nd March** at 7pm, when Bristol's own <u>Dr Shelley Hales</u> will be talking about 'Recent Discoveries in Pompeii'.

After years of poor publicity and accusations of mismanagement and neglect aimed at the superintendency at Pompeii, the new excavations in the city have generated enormous public interest, positive headlines, and several internet memes! The combination of the excitement of discovery, the promise of new technologies to aid excavation and analysis and the novelty of finds fresh from the ground has proved enchanting to the point that this has been seen as Pompeii's 'Renaissance'. This talk is an opportunity to take a closer look at the buildings, objects, decoration, and human remains found in Regio V but also to ask whether these excavations are really so different from those of previous generations and what the longer-term consequences might be.

8. A Level Classics & Ancient History Talks

King's College London are offering a number of FREE online Classics and Ancient History talks for A Level students to get stuck into...

- On Thursday 3rd March (15:00-16:00) <u>Dr Emily Pillinger</u> will be giving a talk on 'The Great Gatsby and The Dinner of Trimalchio: Decadence in New York and Ancient Rome' in which she will demonstrate how one of the best-loved American novels of the twentieth century emerged from Fitzgerald's reading of a much less well-known ancient Roman novel by Petronius. There is no need for students to know anything of either work before the talk. Details and sign-up available <u>here</u>.
- Next, on Wednesday 16th March (15:00-16:00) <u>Dr James Corke-Webster</u> will be giving a talk on the Julio-Claudian period, addressing the Ancient History A level compulsory period study 'The Julio-Claudian Emperors, 31 BC-AD 68' with particular focus on the Res Gestae as a source for Augustus. - Finally, on Wednesday 23rd March (15:00-16:00) Professor Dominic
 Rathbone will be giving a second talk on the Julio-Claudian period for the same compulsory study this time with particular focus on our sources on Nero's reign and the death of Agrippina. Sign up online here.

10. JACT Latin Camp

Last but not least, applications are now open for this year's JACT Latin Summer School (aka Latin Camp) which promises to be as much fun as always!

The two-week residential course is based at Harrogate Ladies' College in Yorkshire and will run from **Monday 18**th to **Saturday 30**th **July**. It includes intensive Latin language courses for all levels and ages, daily grammar clinics to consolidate learning, and a packed programme of evening talks and educational activities, including trips to Roman sites.

The course costs range from £200 to £870 depending on residency and duration, with some bursaries available for those in need.
