1. Wyedean Classics Club

While COVID-19 put a spanner in the works of many extracurricular activities in schools, some teachers in our network found creative ways to sustain their students' engagement with Classics.


In March 2021, Wyedean School in Chepstow launched a Classics Club open to all students from Year 7 to Year 13 to provide keen students with an opportunity to study the classical world.

"From the beginning, Club members needed to work independently since much of the time we were locked down," teacher Lucy Roberts explains. "Meetings were on Teams and we weren't able to meet altogether in person due to bubbles."

Students were given the task of designing their own research projects, allowing them freedom to investigate whichever aspect of the classical world interested them most.

"The beauty of project work is that students could work at their own pace and to their own challenge level," Lucy continues. "The aim was to ignite interest and intellectual curiosity – not to dampen enthusiasm through unnecessarily high expectations."

2. Inclusive Classics at ARLT Summer School

What does the term 'inclusive classics' mean to you?

On Wednesday 28th July, Hub Manager Dr Hannah-Marie Chidwick visited the Association for Latin Teaching's Summer School at Blundell's School in Tiverton to run a workshop with Latin teachers and trainees on this topic she's especially passionate about.

The workshop covered how to adopt inclusive approaches to teaching ancient languages in the secondary classroom, such as creating inclusive learning spaces and finding a 'way in' to tricky subjects. There was plenty of participation from the teachers themselves as everyone shared their ideas.

Hannah-Marie will be running a similar workshop at the 'Visions of the Classics' event at Downside School in November.


3. Ancient Greek Philosophy workshops

What was Ancient Greek Philosophy, and why should we care about it today?

Dr Benjamin Folit-Weinberg has developed a **FREE** interactive 40-60 minute workshop for KS2 & KS3 students which aims to demystify the grand and stodgy-sounding field of 'Ancient Greek Philosophy' and show how its major themes and questions continue to shape the way we think about the world.

No knowledge of ancient history is required or assumed. A healthy appreciation for the value of critical thinking and an interest in the notion of justice is appreciated.




Jasmine Elmer and Dr Sharon Marshall head up the new Devon and Cornwall Hub!

6. CATB Greek and Latin CPD

The Classical Association Teaching Board (CATB) have created a series of videos for a **FREE** Latin and Greek online CPD day they organised in September this year. The day was led by practising teachers and academics and was relevant for both experienced secondary teachers and those new to teaching Classics.

All talks are available via <u>YouTube</u> and cover a range of topics, from teaching Plato's Symposium at A Level to Latin Unseens and Virgil's Aeneid at GCSE.



7. Podcast recommendations

Regional Classics is a new podcast series available via <u>Oxford</u> <u>Podcasts</u> and <u>Apple Podcasts</u> produced by the University of Oxford which features discussions with current students, staff and alumni from regions of the UK that have traditionally been underrepresented within the Faculty.

In the third episode of the podcast, Dr Rebecca Armstrong, alumna Molly Gibson-Mee and undergraduate Justin Vyvyan-Jones all discuss their experiences of growing up in the South West and how they became interested in Classics.



8. Ancient Rome Live

On the subject of bringing ancient worlds to life, the <u>American Institute for</u> <u>Roman Culture</u> (AIRC) has produced a fantastic **FREE** educational resource called <u>Ancient Rome Live</u> which is designed to do just that.

Drawing on the extensive experience of the Institute in Rome, the resource has been created to provide unique access to the city, its empire and its legacy, with a library of almost 200 videos filmed on location plus podcasts and articles.



9. CA virtual book club meeting

The Bristol Classical Association will be resuming meetings of its virtual book club via Zoom on Tuesday 23rd of November at 7pm.

For its fifth meeting, the book club will take a detour to the world of comic books and fantasy with Volume 9 of Neil Gaiman's graphic novel The Sandman, entitled The Kindly Ones. As per previous meetings, one of the members of club has generously agreed to introduce the book.

10. Euroclassica exams

Euroclassica, the Federation of European Classics Teachers' Associations, offers **FREE** entry level (Vestibulum) classical language tests: ELEX for Latin and EGEX for Classical Greek. These tests are taken all over Europe in many different countries every year, and successful candidates receive the same European certificate in gold, silver, or bronze as appropriate.

Following the success of their Vestibulum tests, Euroclassica are now also offering tests at intermediate level (Ianua) in Latin and Greek for pupils who have studied the languages for a longer time. Past test papers and further details are available on their <u>website</u>.

Schools must notify Euroclassica if they would like to enter pupils for either Vestibulum or lanua testing, and should email their test results to <u>johnbulwer3@gmail.com</u> once they have completed the process: no later than the end of January 2022. Certificates will be sent out to schools for teachers to award to their students.
