Anger about the situation of the African child


- To correct the missing African voices on Human Rights issues

Average for Africa





But ...


- Significant challenges in realising children's rights
- Unacceptably high prevalence of stunting





Persistent Challenges (Cont'd)

High exclusion of children from basic needs and services



Monitoring performance and disparities

- Which countries are doing well, which ones not
- What are the most common elements among those that are the best and worst performing
- Hence the statistical and quantitative framework - the Child-Friendliness Index




Main Features of the Child-Friendliness Indek

 1. Framework based on International Law/Conventions (CRC) and the African Children's charter

 2. Focusses on Government effort & performance



Child-friendliness Index: Core Elements



Measuring Child-Friendliness (CFI)

What it measures

1. Government Performance in Protection

2. Government Performance in Provision

Protection + Provision = Child Friendliness Score

Measuring Child-Friendliness (CFI) Contd

Based on more than 40 indicators

Covers all 52 African states (except 2)

Convert the scores on Protection and Provision into a Child-Friendliness Ranking for each country



Child-Friendliness Grouping

- Most Child Friendly
- Child Friendly
- Somewhat Child Friendly
- Less Child Friendly
- Least Child Friendly

✓ Effective in achieving better results in child-related outcomes and access to basic services


