Despite the availability of excellent free dictionary resources online, owning a physical copy of a good bilingual dictionary is still recommended for the quality and depth of information it offers. This is something you may wish to consider as you embark on a degree in Italian. Most dictionaries come in either a "pocket"/abridged or main edition. The main edition in ("grande dizionario") is recommended.
