How to get involved in a sepsis survey for GPs

Sepsis is currently a priority for the Royal College of General Practitioners (RCGP). In 2017, the RCGP said sepsis-aware practices and communities were needed to improve timely diagnosis and treatment of patients with sepsis. Sepsis is one of the conditions which prematurely kills people with learning disabilities, the LeDeR programme has found. GPs are being invited to fill in this survey to record their progress over recent years in improving sepsis diagnosis and treatment for all patients.

eLearning training is the only way to become a new LeDeR reviewer

LeDeR eLearning reviewer training is now fully rolled out across the country and is the only way that new reviewers can become eligible to undertake LeDeR reviews. Please contact your Local Area Contact to find out what support is available in your local area to support reviewers. Reviewers urged to make best use of 'on-hold' options in LeDeR Review System

It is important that LeDeR Reviewers and Local Area Contacts make best use of the available drop-down menus within the LeDeR Review System to ensure reviews are formally categorised as being 'on hold'. There can sometimes be lengthy delays to a review being able to be carried out because of other processes, including Child Death Overview Panels (CDOP), safeguarding, an inquest or another type of investigation. Indicating that a review is 'on hold' while other processes are in progress helps the LeDeR programme keep better track of overall review progress. Anyone who needs help with this should speak to their Local Area Contact.
