Clinical Skills: Removing a Dog from a Crate







Unlatch the door.

Before removing a dog from a crate, assess the dog's behaviour and temperament to determine if it is safe to approach. If in doubt, ask a colleague to assess the dog and possibly assist.

N.B. Check the booklet 'CSL_D06 Using a Slip Lead' for information on how to prepare, apply, adjust and secure a slip lead. If it is safe to do so, crouch down next to the crate. Ensure the dog is aware of your presence, e.g. by speaking quietly to the dog.







Open the door slightly, so your body blocks the exit and the dog can not push past you and escape.

You should be in a crouched position, so you can move quickly and easily if necessary. Do not sit on the floor.

While the dog is still in the crate and while still blocking the exit with your body: Apply the slip lead, adjust the loop to the correct size and then secure with the stopper.

Open the door fully and stand up, then let the dog leave the crate, keeping a secure hold on the lead..



Clinical Skills: University of BRISTOL Returning a Dog to a Crate



Keeping a firm hold on the lead, encourage the dog to enter the crate. You may want to place a treat in the cage.



Crouch down and half close the door, so your body is blocking the exit. Keep a firm hold of the lead.



Remove the slip lead, with your body still blocking the door to prevent the dog from escaping.



Close the door and secure the latch/es.

- When crouching down next to a dog, it's important to be able to stand up quickly, in case the dog lunges towards you.
- There is often more than one latch on a crate; double check when opening and remember to secure each when closing!
